- Step 4: Use the SSPESH scoring key as a guide to interpret your scores in each section, and overall.
- Step 5: Consider what these results may mean for your school planning and action.

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## SSPESH Scoring Guide

The 13 items in the SSPESH comprise four domains assessed on a four-point scale of 0 (Not yet in place) to 3 (Completely in place). The first three domains contain three items, each with a score ranging from 0 to 9. The fourth domain contains four items and the score can range from 0 to 12. A SSPESH total score, calculated by summing all 13 items, can range from 0 to 39.

Although the SSPESH score can be used as a continuous variable, it may be useful to categorise scores. The scoring key below defines the thresholds for the three bands of school performance, identified as low, moderate, and high. These bands are provided as a guide to interpreting the SSPESH total score and domain scores for your school. Importantly, don't consider the results in isolation. Discuss and investigate the results with your staff to explain what they may represent in the context of your school.

<b>Scoring key – Guide to current school performance</b>	<b>SSPESH bands</b>		
	<b>Low</b>	<b>Moderate</b>	<b>High</b>
Positive school community score:	0-5	6-8	9
Student social emotional learning score:	0-4	5-8	9
Engaging families score:	0-2	3-6	7-9
Supporting students experiencing mental health difficulties score:	0-6	7-10	11-12
SSPESH total score:	0-20	21-32	33-39

Note: Thresholds are derived from a representative sample of primary schools from New South Wales, Australia. In the first two domains, schools typically perform well, and only schools that have rated all items in the domain as "Completely in place" will receive a rating within the "high" band.

You might like to circle the appropriate band for each domain and the total score, based on your results to the SSPESH.

What might this brief snapshot mean for your school planning and action?
